Don't be in Rat Race...Drive with Grace !

First Responder Training Program at Maruti Suzuki's IDTR.

Maruti Suzuki India conducted training sessions for 8,500 people primarily commercial drivers. The training was conducted in partnership with AIIMS, one of the country's premier medical institutes, and the International Road Federation (IRF), through a pilot programme.

The training equips them with the knowledge and practical skills needed to assist road accident victims during the "golden hour" in the event of a road incident. The golden hour after an accident refers to the first hour after an accident during which medical intervention can reduce mortality. The First Responder Training Programme is designed to train drivers in critical life-saving techniques like cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), controlling bleeding, the correct way to remove a helmet, the use of splint and sling and moving victims safely. Participants also learn to promptly activate emergency response systems. These skills can improve survival rates, especially in the first hour after an accident, the company said in a press statement.

Maruti Suzuki partnered with AIIMS and IRF to provide first aid and trauma care training to commercial drivers at its Institute of Driving and Traffic Research (IDTR). The pilot initiative took place at IDTR in Haryana, Delhi, and Bihar. The company highlighted that the participants received comprehensive training in emergency care in collaboration with Jai Prakash Narayan-AIIMS Trauma Centre, Delhi.

Furthermore, acquiring basic first aid skills was empowering, as it equips us with the ability to provide immediate assistance in various emergency scenarios. From CPR to removing helmet safely, these skills are invaluable in preserving life and minimizing the impact of injuries until professional help arrives.

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Emerging Technologies in Road Construction at High Altitude

Slope and embankment protection with advanced technology are essential aspects for constructing durable infrastructure, particularly in hilly areas.

• Specialized approaches, regular inspections and monitoring are essential to identify potential hazards like landslides and rock falls.

- Adequate drainage systems must be in place to manage heavy rainfall and prevent erosion.
- Snow and ice control measures are crucial during winter months.
- Maintenance crews with appropriate tools and equipment to address emergencies promptly.
- Advanced technologies, such as weather forecasting and real-time monitoring, aid in effective decision-making.
- Community involvement and awareness campaigns contribute to road preservation.

One of the standout initiatives in this regard was the 'Walk Towards Safer Roads' activity organized by the Aware Learners Club in school. Designed for students of classes II & III, this thought-provoking event aimed to foster a culture of road safety within the school community and beyond. Through a dynamic street play, the students creatively conveyed important messages about road safety to their peers and the wider community. This was complemented by interactive auiz sessions that reinforced key safety measures and encouraged active participation.

In addition to in-house initiatives, the school recognizes the importance of utilizing external resources for comprehensive road safetv education. What Chanakya Says...

Rampant Encroachments of Pedestrian Facilities Leave Them Highly Vulnerable

Pedestrian facilities are the sidewalks or footpaths alongside the road, pedestrian cross-walks, cycle lane or cycle track, etc. Mostly these are understood to be as the facilities for non-motorised modes of travel only. While there are established standards from Indian Roads Congress (IRC) for design and construction of all such facilities, most of the time the standards are not followed simply to fit to the existing or available space. Where the standards are followed to provide generous pedestrian facilities, these are also encroached by vendors, motorised traffic, and even the residents. So much so, the government agencies (like utility and police departments) also encroach the legitimately provided footpaths and other such facilities for pedestrians.





A large number of such facilities are not constructed nor maintained in usable conditions, as these are not provided as clean and usable facilities. Often it appears that the concerned authorities like Urban Local Bodies (ULBs) have created the facility just to show the expenditure for specific head of account, just for ticking the box, and not at all for a purposeful development or creation of usable infrastructure. For example, the tactile paving is done on a footpath for visually impaired disabled persons. But, the way such tactile paving are done, no visually impaired person will be able to use the facility safely, and the isolated and non-coherent development of such facilities for disabled persons do not serve any purpose. These are highly hazardous with poles or trees obstructing the footpath frequently or open drain or vertical drop on the sides, and cannot be used safely by disabled persons, as shown in the figures.

In addition, most often the utility departments find the footpath as the most suitable location for their installations taking away the part or even the whole footpath forcing the pedestrians to use the carriageway with motorised traffic. There is deliberate and systematic encroachment of pedestrian facilities by the utility and police departments to create their infrastructure. The photographs show police booth constructed covering whole footpath, pipeline on footpath provided on a canal bridge, as well as traffic monitoring camera or high mast light pole, all are provided on footpath without any concern for inconvenience caused to the pedestrians. In addition, a large number of cases of very careless planning, design and implementation of pedestrian facilities can be found everywhere. All these have resulted in pedestrian fatalities of 32,862 in 2022 out of a total of 168,491 in the country due to road crashes, which is a whopping 19.5% in addition to similar huge number of injuries.





No doubt, the pedestrians need to be sensitized for use of footpaths and to be disciplined; but that alone will not solve the problem. There is an equally important task of sensitizing or actually building capacity in the planners, designers, policy makers for a complete change in their planning/design skills as well as the policy and philosophy in favour of providing legitimate pedestrian facilities. The outlook and commitment of the Road Authorities and ULBs towards provision of pedestrian facilities must be changed. National standards for planning, design and implementation of facilities for pedestrians be strictly followed, while enforcement of road traffic rules be uniform for all modes including the pedestrians. Thus for ensuring safety, the enforcement skills and capacity must be enhanced using technologies for legitimate enforcement on pedestrian as well.

AI in Safer Roads & Safer Mobility

India has a crack on every second road, but Dubai has close to none! What has made it possible? - Artificial Intelligence. Dubai uses a laser technology, fixed on top of patrolling cars which spot the cracks, in order to fix these roads. The vehicle also possesses a high-resolution camera that examines the roads and instantly scans for defects. The camera then displays the footage on the driver's dashboard to monitor the road. When the driver observes the road defects, he can make his way towards the safer side. This technology is so efficient that it can scan defects as small as 1mm on the roads, collecting data like crack width, depth and location. It also helps the authorities make an accurate virtual map of Dubai roads with an accuracy of 97%. This data is helpful for the Dubai Road and Transport Authority (RTA) in rectifying defects. This year, the technologies to the ability to detect 13 defect types will help fix close to 168 kilometers of roads in the country. Moreover, its ability to detect 13 defect types will also help to fix 168 km of roads this year, which is double the number of Kilometers fixed last year. This laser technology is a remarkable innovation that has transformed the long process of checking and fixing defects. Dubai is on the right track to improve its roads and revolutionize safety. Do you think it is time for India to adopt such technologies as well?
